Commodore Comments by Bill Kenney

Summer is here and life at Mission Bay Yacht Club is beautiful. The TNTs have been going strong, the Junior Program is having another excellent

season, and the sailing competitions are being well attended. I want to be at MBYC as much as possible, and so do a lot of other members as well.

Membership and access, and their symbiotic relationship, directly affect the Yacht club experience. We have an interesting quandary of issues here. How do we maintain a healthy membership

while managing a limited amount of access? We have only so many parking spots, wet slips, and dry storage. Your Board of Directors is working hard on finding a balance.

Port Captain Chuck Weber and his team have been working hard implementing or Underway policy. They are doing a great job! I have mentioned this before and will continue to restate it: MBYC is not a storage facility, we are an active and vibrant Yacht Club. The Underway policy is meant to encourage participation and also discourage the stagnation of equipment. Get out there and use your boats! If you are like me, and find you are not using one or more of your yachting lifestyle assets, maybe it is time to reassess the value of keeping it. Getting rid of something I'm not using anymore opens up a spot for someone else. This helps keep the Club healthy.

Membership and parking and their relationship to each other is always a hot topic, especially during the busy season. Many times throughout the year the Board of Directors receives complaints about the parking access and the policies used to manage it. For several years we have instituted a summer parking restriction, allowing member only parking during the peak season, for a better member experience. Recently, a notice was sent out to the membership as an effort of letting everyone know the coming weekend was expected to be busy, and this might impact parking availability. We also offer a limited number of guest passes for your convenience on a first come first served basis. I highly recommend checking in with the office for these passes if you'd like to invite guests to the club during the days with restricted parking.

Our many sailing events impact the parking lot. Regattas are typically invitationals, and as the host our club tries to accommodate out of town travelers to support the sailing. If the Board of Directors deems any regatta will be impactful to the parking, the Regatta Chairman is charged with asking for accommodations or the participants can drop off their boats and trailers and then park outside. Some events like our Open House receive an exception to

the parking rule to support the event and encourage outside participation. Other events, like weddings or parties, must comply with our membership only policy.



The amount of membership population directly affects the parking lot. How many members is too many? I have been on the Board of Directors for about 7 years now, and membership has hovered around 650-680 family memberships. A modest increase came about a few years ago when the

economy gained some strength. Since then, we've consistently been in the 670ish range. This number is an average of all membership classes, and we call it an equivalent number to give it context: we have on average 675 equivalent family memberships.

Every month we experience membership losses through various reasons. This averages about 2 to 5 memberships a month. With this much attrition, we need to plan on adding a certain amount of members every year for replacement to continue the viability of the club. We also count on the initiation fees as a budget item. Adding about 25 members a year, for example, not only replaces membership loss, but it adds \$62,500.00 to our revenue. That is no small number. The Open House along with other special promotions we might employ throughout the year generates some buzz, all in the effort to add members.

We all enjoy Mission Bay Yacht Club and want it to remain a wonderful place for our family and friends and lifestyles. How do we maintain our Yacht Club, keeping it healthy and viable while maximizing our experience? By encouraging participation and adding new members. I think we've been in balance for the last few years, albeit with the occasional crowded parking lot during the good weather season. The Board of Directors knows that the parking limitations do impact the club experience for everyone, members and guests alike. I can promise you this is taken into consideration for every large event we approve, especially during the busy times of the year. By being proactive, and reaching out to our members to give them notice when we think a particular weekend might unduly affect the parking, we hope to improve member understanding and the club experience as well.

I look forward to seeing you there!





Vice Commodore Comments by Bill Sweeney

It is summer time already! What a great first six months for MBYC. We have hosted multiple regattas with great success. The Butler was even better than last year. The 2019 club budget is on track. Our Membership Chairperson held a successful open house in early June to introduce new, current and potential

members to the club history and all the various fleets. All in all, the club is running quite well.

The Board of Directors has formed a committee to evaluate and purchase a couple new club boats to upgrade and replace some of the aging fleet. As of this writing, negotiations are in process for the first new boat. The Board also is aware of the ongoing maintenance requirement to the fleet in general. We have approved the purchase of a couple new engines each of the next few years. The hulls are being cleaned and repaired as necessary and possible. These boats are heavily used and need to be cared for by everyone that uses the club assets. Our



fleet needs to last as long as possible and will only do so if they are properly cared for while being launched, used and put away. This includes proper cleaning after each use. Please report any issues with the boats, big or small to the front office immediately. All of us can make these boats last.

There are a few repair projects that have been delayed due to material availability and missing competitive bids. All identified projects are on the maintenance schedule. We are very aware of a few cosmetic and structural issues that need immediate attention and are at the top of the list.

MBYC has a set number of parking spaces. For the most part, there are spaces available when membership comes down to the club. Summer time will be more difficult than any other time of the year, which is why member only parking is being enforced. This is an ongoing challenge that we all need to understand and support. It is a reality of belonging to a yacht club in the middle of Mission Beach. Awesome location, but sometimes a difficult place to park. Come on down early and enjoy a great breakfast from the galley to start a fantastic day at the club.

Our Port Captain has been busy with the new "Underway Policy" requiring each boat in wet or dry storage to demonstrate they actually float and perform as intended. You can call it seaworthiness. We are all delighted to see how well the majority of the vessels and captains got underway. There are a few that have not made the effort and are subject to the Underway Policy rules.

MBYC is your club. The Board of Directors is in place to serve you and the club in general. If there are any issues that need to be addressed, please bring it to any of us. Everybody wants to enjoy how great of a place this is for our families, friends and fellow boating enthusiasts. Enjoy the rest of summer.



Port Captain Report

Please contact the port captain or the office if you want to leave a boat on the rigging dock for more than a few hours. The rigging dock is often committed for regatta or other events or used as temporary mooring for members or for reciprocating club visitors, if slips are not available. Often, there are slips that can be used on a temporary basis. We make every effort at MBYC to provide temporary space for our club members, if available, and to serve as a gracious host to members of reciprocating yacht clubs requesting guest slips or temporary mooring assignments. This year so far, we have been able

to accommodate numerous requests for temporary space from MBYC members and quests from other clubs. You can help by advising us if you plan to vacate your slip for more than a day or two. This helps greatly in our ability to respond positively to these requests.

Just another reminder that the club prohibits "dead storage" and requires that your boat must be properly maintained and seaworthy. If you no longer use or enjoy your boat and consider selling or moving it, please let us know. Consider the monthly storage fees, maintenance and insurance costs necessary to keep a neglected boat at the club. If you are not using your boat, please consider selling or donating. We may even be able to help find a buyer for your boat. With a long list of members waiting for wet and dry storage, information on possible upcoming vacancies would be appreciated and helps with planning and coordination.

Thanks to all the boat owners who have complied with the club requirements and provided current copies of marine liability insurance and vessel registration or documentation. Please continue to provide current copies of, registration, documentation, and insurance with a minimum of \$300,000 marine liability insurance with fuel and other spill liability, and naming MBYC as additional insured party. Remember that your slip fees will double if you fail to provide current documents.



The number of unauthorized boats on the rigging docks, and boats and trailers left in the parking lot, on the North lawn, and in the dry storage spaces has increased significantly to the point of becoming a problem and a nuisance. You must check with the office and obtain a temporary trailer tag prior to parking a trailer or leaving a boat at the club. Club members may store a trailer in the lot for a maximum of ten days. Thanks to all for your cooperation in keeping our rigging docks clear for our regatta events during the busy summer months. Your ongoing efforts and consideration are appreciated and

help to avoid congestion at the docks during our busy times.



- January 1, 2019 Persons 25 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2020 Persons 35 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2021 Persons 40 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2022 Persons 45 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2023 Persons 50 years of age or younger
- January 1, 2024 Persons 60 years of age or younger

Summer is heating up and so is the racing! There will be TNT's, Bay Races and Short course racing throughout July and August. A big thanks to all of the PROs, Scorers and Race Committee volunteers who have and will donate their time on and off the race course to support all of the racing at MBYC !

MBYC again has the privilege of hosting the CFJ Nationals on July 25-28. So be ready for all the competitors and their parents who will be visiting our club. For more information contact Chris Wright.

In August TNTs and Sunday racing continue. Please check you fleet assignments for Race Committee assignments. If there are any problems please contact Steve Cooper or me for help.

We will host two regattas in August. The first is the MBYC One-Design Regatta on August 17 and 18. There will be both ocean and bay competitions. Joe O'Leary and Grant Williams are PROs and the Senior Sabots and Lidos will provide Race Committee staff. On August 23 and 24,

we will host the Finn North American Regatta. Stan Betts will be PRO and the MultiHulls will provide Race Committee staff. Information will be available on the club website and Facebook page.

I would like to remind everyone about proper procedures for our club-owned boats use for Race Committee service. Firstly, the club is actively involved in replacing our aging power boat fleet to provide safe, reliable, useful boats for our members to use. By the time you read this we may have already replaced at least one of

the ocean boats with a much newer and reliable one. We are also making upkeep and repair of club boats a high priority. Remember, if a boat has a problem when you use it, write up a repair ticket at the office with the specifics on the problem so it can be quickly addressed.

When an ocean boat is needed for an offshore race, make sure to check with Jason or Nick at least a week before the event. That way if there is a problem with a boat, it can be addressed so the boat is working and available the day of the race. Ocean boats are splashed and removed by Nick and the Maintenance staff. But, all Race Committee equipment used (anchors, buoys, PFDs, flags, etc.) must be removed by the members operating the boats and returned to their proper place in the Race Committee room. Each boat key set has a Race Committee room key on it. Make sure that the Race Committee room is locked when all equipment has been returned and put in its proper place. If any RC equipment is damaged or lost during use, make out a repair ticket at the office and address it to me. The office staff will make sure that it gets to me for action.

Thanks so much to Nick who is always making sure our RC equipment



and boats are in good working order. The quest for an organized RC room is ongoing thanks to Staff Commodore Brian Anderson who has been a great help me. Between to the two of us, equipment is the



in good working order and mostly organized. Thank you in advance for your help as you put things away after each race. There are photos posted on the cabinet door to show where all of the equipment should be placed. We also have two new electric inflators for ocean marks in the cabinet.

To help with good operation of club boats, please use the following checklist

Beginning of the race

 Check out keys from office. Note only members who have been checked out by a board member or club operator class may operate a club boat.

- Check out a handheld radio from the office. Check the battery level to make sure it's charged and working
- 3. Uncover boat(s) and leave the cover in the parking area
- 4. Check fuel level. If the fuel level is low, check with Nick to fill it or use another boat.
- 5. Inspect lifting bridal before hook-up
- 6. Install drain plugs (VERY IMPORTANT)

7. Hook up the lifting sling and hoist boat into water

8. Return boat trailer to maintenance shed area — do not leave on dock or in wash rack

9. Ocean boats will be in the water on the dock

10. Lower and lock engine

 Start engine, verify steady cooling stream, listen for normal/smooth operation

12. Check steering

13. Check shifter - forward and reverse shifting operation 14. Load all RC equipment needed for the race – check with the PRO to be sure that all necessary flags, floats, PFDs, inflators, etc. are in the boat and in working condition.

15. Make sure to take clipboards, pencils, and result sheets in case they are needed. 16. Once underway, conduct radio check with handheld and/or boat mounted radios to be

sure you have communications with the other RC boats

- After the race
- 1. Turn off the motor, turn off battery switch, tilt motor up
- 2. Remove all RC equipment from the boat and return to RC room
- 3. Securely tie up ocean boats on the dock staff will hoist them out
- 4. Lift small boats out of water onto the correct trailer
- 5. No small boat is to remain in the water after a race unless it is to be used the next day
- 6. Remove drain plug, hose out the boat, and remove all trash
- 7. Park boat in designated spot and replace the cover
- 8. Turn in your keys at the office
- 9. Report any damage or mechanical issues by completing a repair ticket at the office



The Lido fleet is in the heart of summer racing season and we're enjoying warm water and sunshine. Our busy preseason included two clinics, the Pete Jefferson Memorial Regatta, Race Committee, and the MBYC Open House. Our fleet championship series is underway, which includes a mix of TNTs, Bay Races and Short Courses through the summer.

In the spirit of competition, Quantum Sails and Ullman Sails both produce excellent Lido tuning guides. Put "Lido tuning guide" into Google and both will pop up. They are worth reading.

Okay, so the tuning guides tell you what you should do, but it's also important to know what not to do. Here are the top 10 things to avoid in your Lido this summer.

1. Old crane harnesses and hardware. Gravity can move your boat faster than hull speed from the crane to the dock. Impact with the dock does not make a fast boat.

2. Leaving warm clothes at home. Summer is here, but a wet and cold crew does not bode well for racing. Crew should be warm and comfortable at all times.

3. Running out of drinking water. If you're reciting The Rime of the

Ancient Mariner, you will be less likely to be sharp on tactics. Becoming dehydrated is slow and dangerous.

4. Leaving your watch at home. Guessing the time is not a good starting strategy.

5. Not knowing the course. "Wow, we rounded first!" "Wait, what course was it again?" If you want to win, you have to stay ahead of the fleet and know where the next mark is located.

6. Leaving the centerboard up while rounding the leeward mark. I heard this from a friend.

7. Trusting old hiking straps. Breaking a hiking strap is a quick way to turn the Lido into a single-handed boat when you go overboard.

8. Not maintaining a positive attitude. Races include multiple legs and staying positive can help the skipper and crew recognize opportunities to make gains.

9. Not communicating. Skipper and crew should be helping each other see boats, shifts, and gusts. Surprise tacks and surprise starboard boats are not the good kind of surprises.

10. Not sailing. A Lido on the trailer is its slowest point of sail. Come out and join us for good fun and competition this summer!
