### **Commodore Comments**

Here we are near the end of the year. My last article for my last Mainstay. We have been down a long road together, through many reports and many

Mainstay issues. Now the time has come to bring it all to a close.

This year's Board of Directors had several goals to accomplish. One was to address our impacted storage, and the other was to try and boost membership participation at the club. The first goal to achieve was to reinforce our Underway

This policy has always been on the books but had been lacklusterly supported throughout the years. The result: many unused boats languishing in our wet and dry storage. To change this, we began with embracing the simple philosophy that MBYC is not a storage facility. MBYC is a yacht club that enables our members to experience their boating craft and yachting lifestyle. Your faithful Port Captain, Chuck Weber, spearheaded the effort to reinforce the Underway Policy by instituting checks and deadlines. Almost every single vessel qualified. This resulted in an overall compliance rate of 97% for all modes of storage.

We can now have confidence that any vessel on MBYC property is active and being used on a yearly basis at least. The policy also pressures those unused vessels to move on, making room for our ever-growing waiting list for people and families hoping to be active boating members. This policy subtly helps to meet the second goal of increasing participation.

The second goal to increase member participation will be helped by another newly enacted policy. Earlier this year, your Board of Directors voted to approve the creation of a Food and Beverage minimum for the Mission Bay Yacht Club membership. This issue has been discussed many times over many years, and now your Board feels the time is right to make it happen.

As you know, the Galley is not a typical restaurant. The hours of operation do not include all meals every day of the week, and usually caters to when there will be the most activity at the Club to support its operation. This makes a very difficult budget situation for the galley.

Many of you may already know the galley operates at a loss, some years in the tens of thousands of lost dollars. The bar does offset these losses to a certain degree, but the instability of galley revenue has hampered the ability to create a satisfying dining experience at a reasonable cost.

A quick look at all the many different types of social clubs around shows that a Food and Beverage minimum is the industry standard. This provides the kitchen or galley with a known revenue, and strongly supports the viability of the operation. For many years the addition of a minimum has been debated at MBYC, and now we are making it a reality.

The Board of Directors has taken a very measured approach in rolling out the fee, knowing our galley performance needed immediate improvement

> to warrant the additional costs to our membership. In preparation, we have hired a new chef and supporting staff. We have refined the job description of the chef to be more performance oriented, and we have strengthened our menu requirements while still allowing for culinary expression. In the future, we should expect more subtle changes, like expanded operating hours for example.

How much is the fee, when will it begin, and who is required to pay? Your Board of Directors has worked hard at finding the best solution. The fee will be \$300.00 per year, starting in January of 2020, and will be seen as a running total on your monthly statement. This equates to \$25.00 per month for your typical member. Each member will see a running total on their monthly statement. How to pay the minimum is up to each individual member, but only purchases from the Bar or the Galley will apply. If charging to a member account, nothing more needs to be done. However, if a member is paying cash or with a credit card, simply give a member name or member number to the MBYC staff taking your order to have the purchase apply towards the minimum.

All membership levels will be responsible for the Food and Beverage minimum, with the exceptions of Sandpipers, Juniors, Honorary, and Active Military members. Any questions or concerns should be directed to the Board of Directors or the General Manager. This is a big change for our members, but we know it is the right decision. Come on down to the Club once a month and have lunch or dinner, or buy a few beverages at the bar. You'll enjoy your Club a little bit more, and the minimum will be met easily and will support your galley, increase the food quality, and maintain a more consistent culinary experience.

I need to thank all of the current Board members for their incredible volunteer efforts over the past year. Everyone has done a great job, and I could not be more proud and honored to have served with them. Special thanks to the membership as well for all the support that has been given to this Board of Directors. Serving as your Commodore has been a wonderful privilege, and I am so pleased to have been able to give back to a place that brings so much into my life.

Lastly, this is my final issue as editor of the Mainstay. I have enjoyed serving as your editor over these past 4 years and I want to thank everyone involved for their support. Being your editor has allowed me to use my professional skills to bring an enjoyable reading experience, and I am thankful for the opportunity.

# Port Captain Report

As we wind down the year 2019, I want to leave you with a few timely and important reminders.

Pay attention to your DMV Renewal Notice for Vessel Registration. The Biennial Vessel Renewal Fee is \$20. You do not have to pay the additional \$16 Quagga and Zebra Mussel Infestation Prevention fee if you use your vessel exclusively in marine waters. Upon renewal, please promptly forward a copy of your 2021 Vessel Registration to the Club office.

Fire Station 21, located on the NW corner of Mission Blvd. and Grand Avenue, will accept and properly dispose of your expired flares. In order to meet the requirement for pyrotechnic visual distress signals, the expiration date must not have expired. If you have a collection of expired flares, consider dropping by the Fire Station.

As of January 1, 2020. A California Boater Card issued by the California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW) is required for individuals age 35 or younger, operating a motorized vessel. Vessel operators must carry the card on board the vessel and have it available for inspection by an enforcement officer. Not carrying your California Boater Card when it is required can result in a fine. The San Diego Lifeguards on Mission Bay are enforcing this requirement. BoatUS offers a free online course and test and the one-time cost of the card is \$10.

MBYC Underway Policy requires that boats in wet slips or dry storage be actively engaged in yachting activities and be capable of getting underway and performing underway activities appropriate to comparable boats. This policy was implemented in January 2019 and applied to approximately 700 boats located in both wet and dry storage areas. While not every member met the published deadlines, I am pleased to report that, as of this date, we have documented and recorded 97% compliance. The support of vessel owners, and the assistance from our fleet captains, our management and office staff



has been, very much appreciated and instrumental in achieving this goal. We have seen several unused, unwanted or neglected boats either leave the club or undergo required maintenance and repairs and we have been able to assign space to members on our waiting lists.

Options are available if you wish to dispose of an unwanted boat. Consider donating your boat, receiving a tax deduction (with receipt), and supporting the San Diego Oceans Foundation. Please contact Richard Sheppard at 858-488-8697

or richardshep@hotmail.com, to arrange for pick up by a San Diego Oceans Foundation representative or to obtain additional information.

I would like to end the year by expressing my gratitude to you for allowing me to serve the Club as your Port Captain for 2019. I have enjoyed and appreciated both the positive feedback and the comments relating to "improvement opportunities". I would like to recognize the tremendous efforts, the time commitment and support of Bill Black, Assistant Port Captain, Marc Umemoto, Assistant Port Captain for Dry Storage, Paul Culkin, Assistant Port Captain for Sabot Storage, Phil Taylor, Assistant Port Captain, Bikes, Kayaks& Lockers, Mark Langman, our very patient and accommodating accountant, our outstanding office staff, our club management, and our overwhelmingly supportive 2019 Board of Directors. I would be remiss if I failed to recognize the extraordinary level of both support and patience, throughout the year, from my lovely wife, Lauren. Best for the holidays and 2020.




# Rear Commodore Comments

# **Secretary Treasurer Report**







#### **Power Fleet**

As you may have heard, the Power Fleet has big, big news on two fronts: Dedication of this year's Fish Fry proceeds toward two important Club expenditures, and the merger of the Fleet with our friends in the Racing Cruising Fleet. Both will have a sizable effect on quality and variety of life at the Club.



The Fish Fry is the Power Fleet's main event and our primary annual fund-raising opportunity. I

So, what to do? Exact division of funds is not yet determined; however, the Fleet will skew support heavily toward new chairs. (If you've had the pleasure of sitting on the existing chairs you would, on bended knee, be cheering and praying for replacements.)

What is the estimated size of this financial support? That is, my fellow Club member, up to you. The Fish Fry is scheduled for Saturday, November 9. With your support we can count on a very big success, eclipsing those in recent memory. Reading this will find us in early November and very close to the event. 



Day Two was better than the first. We hit more of our lay lines, and our downwind wire-to-wire gybes were much crispier. The current was like Day One, but we went out much earlier so we hit the water at low tide. That was nice because we spent more time on the upwinds since most of the time the current was flooding. By the end of the day the current had switched and the wind had picked up to its peak. After three upwind and downwind runs, many starts and two practice races, we headed in. We debriefed the same way we did the day before and thanked Charlie for his awesome coaching as he would be lost to the 29ers the next day.

Day Three was our final day, and we were coached by Pete and Adam. Our practice that day was shorter because we had to take the boats apart and my teammates had flights to catch. We sailed practice races all day which allowed us to put our newly learned skills to the test.

The whole weekend was a great experience and I would like to thank U.S. Sailing, the Belvedere Cove Foundation, the St. Francis Sailing Foundation, all the coaches, and JIB for making this happen.
